

Common Municipal Code Violations

A significant number of thefts from vehicles involve teens. Parents need to know where their teens are and make sure they comply with curfew laws.

Enforcement of curfew laws is a priority for the Derby Police Department. Curfew for children under the age of 18 is midnight.

Curfew Violation

It is unlawful for any minor under the age of 18 to loiter, idle, wander, stroll or play in or upon the public streets, highways, roads, alleys, parks, playgrounds or other public grounds, public places and public buildings, places of amusement and entertainment, vacant lots or other unsupervised places between midnight and 6 a.m.

Noise Ordinance

Noise from any source, minus a few exceptions, when measured at a level equal to or in excess of the maximums established by Derby City Code between the hours of 7 a.m. and 10 p.m., is considered noise pollution. Noise levels and the exceptions can be found at www.derbyweb.com/citycode.

Prevent Theft from Vehicles

Thefts from vehicles is a crime that increases during the summer months. Many people leave their car windows partially down due to the heat, which makes vehicles a tempting target for thieves. Many of these thefts can be prevented by following some simple guidelines.

- Always lock your car, even if it is parked in front of your house.
- Do not leave valuables in your vehicle. Many thefts involve people leaving phones, purses, tools, money and other valuables in plain sight. If a thief can see it, they will take it. If you need to leave something in your car, it is best to lock in your trunk or glove compartment out of sight.
- Park in your driveway or garage if possible.
- Park in well lit areas if possible. Not only is this safer for you as you go to and from your car, but it less likely thieves will target your vehicle.
- Keep your garage door shut, even if you are home.

Report any suspicious activity to the Derby Police Department by calling 911. Officers generally respond within a few minutes.
